

## LAWN HEIGHT & WEED NOTICE No Notice Given

Pursuant to the Village of Kimberly Code of Ordinances, notice is hereby given to each person who owns, occupies, or controls land in the Village of Kimberly, Outagamie County, State of Wisconsin, to destroy all noxious weeds and to cut or remove the accumulation or growth of weeds, grass, brush, or other rank or offensive vegetation which has grown to a height greater than eight (8) inches.

A minimum of one hour will be charged to cut noxious weeds or grass 8" or longer at \$75.00 per hour plus equipment usage.



## NEWLY PLANTED TREE CARE

New trees, which will be planted throughout the Village, need care. Please water these trees with *Five (5) gallons* every 4 to 5 days during dry spells.

When mowing and trimming around trees, please avoid hitting the base of the tree. There are quite a few terrace trees with bark torn from the base due to mowing and trimming too close to the tree. If this occurs too often, there is a good chance the tree will die. When a terrace tree dies, the replacement time could take up to 5 years, due to commitments in other areas of the community.

## REMINDER TO SWIMMING POOL OWNERS

We have seen an increase in the number of private storable swimming pools (blue pools) throughout the Village.

All private residential swimming pools whether in ground or above ground having a depth of 24 inches (2 feet) or greater must be enclosed with an adequate fence at least forty-eight inches (4 feet) high above grade to prevent straying into the pool area. A pool dome or pool top capable of supporting one hundred (100) pounds per square foot is an acceptable substitute for fencing.

These pools cannot be located outside the setback areas as defined; 3 feet side and rear yards and 25 feet front yard, or no closer to the street than your house or garage.

If you own a blatter (blue) pool please be responsible for the safety of your children and the safety of others.

If you received a warning letter in any previous year about an unprotected portable swimming pool, this summer a citation will be issued for non-compliance without a warning letter.

## WARNING

### DO NOT PLACE YARD WASTE OR RECYCLING IN YOUR REGULAR GARBAGE!!

In an effort to reduce organic waste and recycling in the landfill, Outagamie County has started to inspect the loads of garbage our drivers dump in the landfill. The Village will be issued a citation if grass clippings, yard waste, other organic materials, or recycling is found in our loads.

Our drivers will be keeping a closer eye on the hopper camera. Yes there is a camera in each of the automated garbage trucks so that they can see what is being dumped in the truck. If they detect any yard waste, grass clippings, or recycling coming out of your cart it will be tagged, and a written warning will be sent to the owner of the property. Any further violations will result in a citation being issued.

**GRASS CUTTING REMINDER**

When cutting your lawn near the street, try to make your first two passes with the discharge chute directed away from the street. Grass can clog up storm sewer catch basins, which doesn’t allow the street to drain properly. Water that drains from the street and into storm sewers ends up in the river, along with all the grass clippings. Grass clippings also hold fertilizer and pesticides that contaminate streams, rivers, and lakes. The DNR encourages leaving grass clippings on your lawn, as they can act as good nutrients, as well as composting your lawn clippings. Residents who blow grass clippings into the street are subject to a citation per ordinance 430-168-430-17.

## OTHER REFUSE PICK UP

### Items We Pick Up

Property owners must place large item collection and metal items out by 6:00am the day of collection or the night before. **Large Item Collection is on the last garbage pick up day of the month.** Example: If your garbage is collected on Tuesday, large item collection is the last Tuesday of the month. If your collection day is Friday, large item collection day is the last Friday. Large items consist of those (non-metal) items that are too large to fit in the poly cart such as: chairs, couches, rolled and tied mattress, carpet rolled and tied in 4' length's not exceeding 50lbs.

**Metal Items and Appliances are collected on Fridays and require the resident or property owner to purchase a metal pick up sticker** at the Village Clerk's Office or the Street Department Office by Thursday for a Friday pick-up. Appliances with freon such as: refrigerators, air conditioners, dehumidifiers, and freezers cost \$15.00. All other appliances and metal items such as: washers/dryers, water heaters, microwaves, bikes, grills, clothes line poles and other metal items cost \$10.00.

**Yard Waste Pick up (lawn edgings and weeds) will be picked up on the 3rd Friday of each month (you must call our office for yard waste pick up)** from May through October. This material must be placed in a brown paper Lawn and Yard waste bags with a special Yard Waste Sticker attached. These stickers are available at the Street Department Office and the Clerks Office at a cost of \$1.00 per sticker. **No grass clippings** will be picked up at any time.

**Brush Pick Up "YOU MUST CALL OUR OFFICE FOR A BRUSH PICK UP."** Brush which is shorter than 12 inches in length is considered yard waste and needs to be disposed of through yard waste collection. Any brush longer than 12 inches and not more than 4" in diameter needs to be called in by 4:00 pm on WEDNESDAY for a Thursday pick up.

### Items We Do Not Pick Up

Property owners must dispose of these materials at the Outagamie County Landfill located in Little Chute.

The Village **DOES NOT pick up overflow garbage.** Overflow garbage consist of normal garbage which does not fit in your poly cart on a given week. When cleaning a garage or basement, excess garbage must be hauled to the landfill by the resident or property owner.

The Village **DOES NOT pick up building materials** (siding, roofing material, windows, drywall, concrete, dirt, etc.) at any time.

The Village **DOES NOT pick up lead acid type batteries** such as car batteries or recreational vehicle batteries.

The Village **DOES NOT pick up LP tanks.** The only way that we know how to get rid of LP tanks are to trade them in when you buy a new one or release the remaining gas, remove the valve and take it to the Outagamie County Landfill for a \$5.00 fee.

The Village **DOES NOT pick up landscaping materials** including wooden fence, railroad ties, wood chips, decorative rock, concrete, and dirt.

The Village **DOES NOT pick up computers.** They contain heavy metals and cannot be disposed of with your garbage. Computers need to be brought to the Outagamie County Clean Sweep Program.

### IS YOUR DOG LICENSED?

Just a reminder that ALL dogs that reside in the Village of Kimberly are required to have an annual dog license. If you have not gotten a 2014 license yet, please stop by the Municipal Center. You must bring the current rabies vaccination certificate. Dogs not licensed by May 21st will receive a \$124.00 citation and still have to pay to license their dog. **Please call 788-7500 with any questions**

### DOGS IN THE PARK

Recently the Village of Kimberly has received numerous complaints of people allowing their dogs to run freely in the parks.

No person shall permit any dog, cat or other pet owned by him to run at large in any park per ordinance 372-1. Citations will be issued in the event you don't have your dog on a leash.

### Reminder

Per Ordinance 180-10: The owner or person in charge of any dog, cat, horse or other animal shall not permit solid fecal matter of such animal to deposit on any street, alley or other public or private property unless such matter is immediately removed therefore by said owner or person in charge. This section shall not apply to a person who is visually or physically handicapped.

EMTEL is the emergency notification system that Outagamie County utilizes to notify the public and responders of incidents and critical situations that are occurring within Outagamie County. It allows the Outagamie County Communication Center to send a recorded message out to a large number of contacts at once. With EMTEL, Outagamie County is able to notify and keep the public up to date on situations as they are quickly occurring and due to the speed and volume of the calls that it is able to send out.

EMTEL has been used for geographical area notifications such as a person with a weapon, a gas leak or a water main break. EMTEL has also been used for paging emergency responder groups such as the Emergency Response Team and the Victim Crisis Response Team.

A notable feature of EMTEL is that it allows the public to access it via the web. The public may enter different contact information so they can be contacted by those means in the case of an emergency. The different options include home, cell and work phones, SMS text, TDD, fax and e-mail. ## Don't be a victim and remember... Crime rises in the Spring and Summer months

Please partner with the FVMPD to reduce crime:

- Lock your car doors.** Thieves often check for unlocked car doors; then rummage through cars for items to steal.

## Educational Information

The sources of drinking water, both tap water and bottled water, include rivers, lakes, streams, ponds, reservoirs, springs and wells. As water travels over the surface of the land or through the ground, it dissolves naturally occurring minerals and, in some cases, radioactive material, and can pick up substances resulting from the presence of animals or from human activity.

Contaminants that may be present in source water include: Microbial contaminants, such as viruses and bacteria, which may come from sewage treatment plants, septic systems, agricultural livestock operations and wildlife. Inorganic contaminants, such as salts and metals, which can be naturally-occurring or result from urban stormwater runoff, industrial or domestic wastewater discharges, oil and gas production, mining or farming. Pesticides and herbicides, which may come from a variety of sources such as agriculture, urban stormwater runoff and residential uses.

Organic chemical contaminants, including synthetic and volatile organic chemicals, which are by-products of industrial processes and petroleum production, and can also come from

gas stations, urban stormwater runoff and septic systems. Radioactive contaminants, which can be naturally occurring or be the result of oil and gas production and mining activities. In order to ensure that tap water is safe to drink, EPA prescribes regulations that limit the amount of certain contaminants in water provided by public water systems. FDA regulations establish limits for contaminants in bottled water, which shall provide the same protection for public health.

## Definitions

### Term Definition

AL	Action Level: The concentration of a contaminant which, if exceeded, triggers treatment or other requirements which a water system must follow.
MCL	Maximum Contaminant Level: The highest level of a contaminant that is allowed in drinking water. MCLs are set as close to the MCLGs as feasible using the best available treatment technology.
MCLG	Maximum Contaminant Level Goal: The level of a contaminant in drinking water below which there is no known or expected risk to health. MCLGs allow for a margin of safety.
MFL	million fibers per liter
MRDL	Maximum residual disinfectant level: The highest level of a disinfectant allowed in drinking water. There is convincing evidence that addition of a disinfectant is necessary for control of microbial contaminants.
pCi/l	picocuries per liter (a measure of radioactivity)
ppm	parts per million, or milligrams per liter (mg/l)
ppb	parts per billion, or micrograms per liter (ug/l)
ppt	parts per trillion, or nanograms per liter

## Health effects for any contaminants with MCL violations/Action Level Exceedances

### Contaminant Health Effects

**LEAD** Infants and children who drink water containing lead in excess of the action level could experience delays in their physical or mental development. Children could show slight deficits in attention span and learning abilities. Adults who drink this water over many years could develop kidney problems or high blood pressure.

### Additional Health Information

If present, elevated levels of lead can cause serious health problems, especially for pregnant women and young children. Lead in drinking water is primarily from materials and components associated with service lines and home plumbing. Kimberly Waterworks is responsible for providing high quality drinking water, but cannot control the variety of materials used in plumbing components. When your water has been sitting for several hours, you can minimize the potential for lead exposure by flushing your tap for 30 seconds to 2 minutes before using water for drinking or cooking. If you are concerned about lead in your water, you may wish to have your water tested.
